bald, Newton, Boyd, Henderson, Samuel, Elizabeth Creswell, Hannah Boyd, Sarah Sims, Fanny Mc-Kenry, Nancy Malcom, Polly McCall. This land is still in the McMurray name.

William Malcom married Love, and located on the Knoxville and Sevierville road, a mile east of Shook's Gap, still recognized by many old settlers as the Malcom place.

John McCallie married Nancy Burney and later Mary McCulloch and located on Nail's Creek near Wildwood. He came from Scotland. He was in the Revolutionary war, but from the State of Pennsylvania.

John McCrosky married Miss Ann Montgomery, and located near the head waters of Boyd's creek. He was of Scotch Irish Presbyterian stock and perhaps among the first in the organization of Eusebia church. The names of John McCrosky, John Pitner, and Andrew Creswell are on the war records at Washington, linked up with the battle of King's Mountain, the decisive battle of the Revolution.

John Pitner who belonged to this generation of settlers married and lived near Trundles Cross Roads. It isn't known that he was a member of the Eusebia church, but his descendants were and it is reasonable to suppose that he too was. The love of liberty put John Pitner, John McCrosky, and Andrew Creswell into the battle of King's Mountain.

John Sharp, Sr., married located east of Trundles Cross Roads on Boyd's Creek. The gleanings accessible as to his life are meager, but it is natural to infer that he was linked up in religious faith and character with the men of his day.

SECOND GENERATION

The names of the heads of the families of the Second Generation, with Eusebia as a religious center, who contributed toward the moulding and shaping of the civil, educational, and religious life of the people of this community, are descendants of the First Generation, with some additional names.

James Boyd married Hannah McMurray, lived on Nail's Creek.

James Black was married three times. His first wife was

His second wife was Mary Bogle. His third wife, Betsy Bogle, his second wife's sister. He located near the head of the Ellejoy Creek. The land is still in the hands of his descendants.

Hugh Bogle married Caldwell. He located between the church and the McTeer place along the little stream with the Eusebia spring as its head.

Hiram Bogle married McCrosky. He located on the hill across the meadow joining the church grounds, now owned by Samuel Rickens.

William Evins Creswell married Elizabeth Mc-Murray, daughter of Samuel McMurray, and purchased the farm on Nail's Creek owned and known now as the Pickens farm. The names of their children were Nancy, Dorothy, Samuel, Minerva, Sarah, Andrew, Dorcas, William Anderson and Elizabeth Hannah. Eight of these married and reared families.

Micheal Fagala married Miss Nancy McCallie and lived in Sevier county, near a little gap in Bay's Mountain which took the name Fagala Gap.

Alexander Breckenridge Gamble married Elizabeth Ransberger, and bought or inherited the Josias Gamble homestead on Little River. Their sons and daughters who married and reared families were John, Moses, Josias, Marion, Ann, Mary, and Nancy.

Robt. L. Houston married twice. His first wife was and his second wife was . He located on the Knox County side of Bay's Mountain on the Knoxville road near Neubert's Mill and reared a family.

John Hafely married Elizabeth Kirkpatrick and lived near Nail's Creek. Andrew and Chas. Hafely were sons of this union.

Samuel E. Creswell married Polly Fagala and settled on old homestead in Sevier County, Fagala Gap.

Ben Cunningham married Sarah Kirkpatrick, Jan. 14, 1818. Major Ben Cunningham was a son of this union. They lived near Nail's Creek in the Boyd settlement.

James Jeffries married and lived between the church and Ellejoy Creek.

James Malcom married Nancy McMurray, daughter of Samuel McMurray, and lived on the Wm. Malcom homestead on the Knoxville and Sevierville Road in Sevier County.

William McTeer, son of Robert McTeer, married Mary McTeer, his cousin, and after her death he married Mary Bogle, daughter of . The McTeer descendants

are from this marriage. They lived on Ellejoy creek.

Robert McCroskey, son of John and Ann Montgomery McCroskey, married Polly Sharp and lived in the neighborhood of the head of spring of Boyd's creek.

Alexander McCallie married Esther Blair McCroskey, and located just east of the Sharp lands on the Knoxville and Sevierville road.

Samuel McMurray married Ella Black and settled on the old McMurray homestead on Nail's creek. This land is still in the McMurray name. Boyd McMurray on Little Tennessee, with numerous descendants. Bart McMurray on the old homestead, with a large family, and Mrs. McCall, with a good sized family have preserved his posterity in blood and name.

McGaughy married , and lived in general Boyd settlement. Descendants of his are living today in Athens, Tennessee.

William McMurray first married a Miss
Lawrence. They had two children.
Then after her death he married Miss Margaret
Malcom, daughter of William Malcom. Several children were born to this union, viz; Samuel, Alexander, and Joseph who have preserved to his name
the blood and posterity. The McMurrays of Jefferson County and the McMurrays of Knoxville are descendants of these sons.

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
